### A letter from our Executive Director

November 1, 2025

To Our Dedicated Staff, Cherished Families, and Community Partners, As we reflect on the fiscal year 2024-2025, I am filled with a profound sense of gratitude and admiration for the resilience of the entire Envision community. This was a landmark year, marking our first full year operating without Case Management services, following its transition to Weld County on March 1, 2024 because of Federal and State Regulations.



The departure of Case Management meant a significant, immediate loss of \$3 million in funding. However, rather than shrink, we found the strength to innovate and grow. I am incredibly proud to report that through expanding services and reaching more people across all our programs, we have not only stabilized but returned our budget to a robust \$9 million. This incredible achievement is a testament to our collective strength and unwavering commitment to the mission of enhancing the quality of life to people with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD) in Weld County. We are strong, doing well, and more focused than ever. Our successes this year are numerous and deeply inspiring. We embraced new Core Values of Stewardship, **Empowerment, and Person-centeredness** as the guiding principles for all we do. These values were brilliantly embodied by one of our Art Facilitators, Chris Leroy who was a finalist for The Alliance Colorado Direct Support Professional (DSP) of the Year. We have streamlined operations, moving time and labor to our webbased payroll system—a change that will save hundreds of administrative hours annually. We were able to hire a PT Accounting Specialist position providing a back-up to the finance positions in the Administration Department, a true success story in stability. We also finished replacing our last round of vehicles with new leases. We restructured Early Intervention to improve efficiencies and ensure that a high quality of services to children and family will always occur, timely, even when short-staffed. Furthermore, we celebrated the highest possible recognition for our integrity: being awarded the BBB Torch Award for Ethics: our YouTube video. Of course, the path forward has its challenges. We are actively navigating State budget cuts, including a 1.6% rate decrease, and the ongoing shift in Early Intervention (EI) regulations. Internally, we are preparing to replace our accounting system and continue to pursue funding for our much-needed facility renovations. But challenges merely fuel our resolve. The Board has committed funds for the paving of the back parking lot, which will begin shortly. For the indoor renovations, we have been working with Alm2s for the design, and will be working with Alliance Construction as our General Contractor. We are in the process of applying for grants and seeking private donations for the building renovations. We are finalizing a three-year Strategic Plan focused on long-term financial health through increased individual and monthly giving, additional business opportunities (primarily due to the building renovations), and a Marketing and Communications Plan. Every accomplishment this year is only possible because of the time, effort and commitment of our staff, Board of Directors, and volunteers, and the support from and collaboration with our community partners and stakeholders. Thank you for your fierce dedication to the people and families we serve. Together, we will continue the vital work of Envision, embodying our values and empowering futures. With Gratitude.



#### WHO WE ARE:


Envision has been providing crucial services to Weld County's most vulnerable groups of people since 1964. As a non-profit, we provide services to people with intellectual and developmental disabilities or delays. At Envision, we are dedicated to empowering individuals and families to live meaningful, self-directed lives. Through our wide range of programs and services, we provide guidance, connection, and support rooted in compassion and person-centered values. #### **EARLY INTERVENTION**

Envision is the only Early Intervention Service Broker in Weld County, which consists of coordinating critical services and supports to infants and toddlers with developmental delays and disabilities and their families. These services and supports may include occupational, speech, physical therapies, parent/caregiver education, and other types of services based on the needs of the child and family. Of the children (ages birth to three years) who receive Early Intervention (EI) services, 45% catch up with their peers and do not require attending a specialized preschool program. This saves taxpavers and the school district hundreds of thousands of dollars over the lifetime of the child. Not to mention the positive impact it has on the child and family.

#### ADDITIONAL ESSENTIAL SERVICES

**Summer Respite Camp** to youth from 12-21 years of age, who are too old for typical childcare and summer programs, and cannot be alone over summer break and their caregiver still needs to work.

**Family Caregiver** in which we can hire or contract with a family member so they can make a living caring for their loved one, keeps families intact, and prevents out-of-home placements that are often more restrictive and costly.

**Adult Residential** that offers up to 24-hour supervision and support in the person's home, and provides or teaches skills such as medication management, meal planning and preparation, health and safety skills, medical appointments, and meaningful community/recreational activities.

Adult Day Program in which people learn skills to be safe and successful in the community with a focus on connecting to people/businesses, purchasing items or services, volunteerism, and safety awareness while engaged in community activities. Some of the more well-known activities in this area include The Aktion Club and the Art Program.

**Supported Employment** offers people the opportunity to be contributing members of society, earn an income, increase self-confidence, and develop meaningful relationships. We offer job assessment, discovery, resume development, interview techniques, job placement, customized employment, and ongoing job coaching.
